What is Chapter 71B?

The Massachusetts special education law, Chapter 71B of the Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 71B (also known as Chapter 766) is a comprehensive education law implemented in Massachusetts in 1972.

This law ensures that children in need of special education, ages 3-22, have a free and appropriate education provided by the local community, to allow them the same chance of success as their classmates.

School districts are required to establish a SEPAC, which acts in both an advisory and a participatory role: The school committee of any city, town, or school district shall establish a parent advisory council on special education. Membership shall be offered to all parents of children with disabilities and other interested parties. The parent advisory council duties shall include but not be limited to: advising the school committee on matters that pertain to the education and safety of students with disabilities; meeting regularly with school officials to participate in the planning, development, and evaluation of the school committee's special education program.
