#### Introduction

What is standards-based instruction & grading?
Standards-based instruction is defined as instruction for student mastery of

a defined set of standards. It is an ongoing teaching and learning cycle that insures all students have opportunities to maximize their learning.

Standards-based grading is an intentional way for teachers to track their students' progress and achievements while focusing on helping students learn and reach their highest potential. It is based on students showing signs of mastery or understanding various lessons and skills.

### Standard Based Report Cards

#### Why Revise the Current report card?

- Ensure that student learning is measured against a consistent set of academic criteria
- Align the indicators for academic performance
- Standards-based instruction and assessment focuses on student's progress with specific skills
- Skills are aligned to the MA Curriculum Frameworks in all content areas
- Instruction is connected to these standards and differentiated based on student need
- Students are assessed on their progress towards meeting these standards rather than receiving a single numeric or letter grade.



### New Standards Based Indicators for Academic Performance

#### **Content and Practice Standards**

- **E Exceeding Expectations**
- **M** Meeting Expectations
- P Partially Meeting/Approaching Expectations
- N Not Yet Meeting Expectations
- N/A- Not Assessed

\*Students are assessed using the end-of-year grade level standards.

#### **Attendance Matters:**

If children don't show up for school regularly, they miss out on fundamental reading and math skills and the chance to build a habit of good attendance that will carry them into college and careers.

- By 6th grade, absenteeism is one of three signs that a student may drop out of high school.
- By 9th grade, attendance is a better predictor of graduation rates than 8th grade test scores.
- e-Satisfactory = Absent less than 9 days a year or 3 days a term
- At Risk = Absent 10-17 days a year or 4-5 days a term
- :-- Chronic = Absent more than 18 days a year or 6 days a term
